Case for Expulsion

Consistent with Administrative Regulation #5144.1, principals may suspend students who are in violation of Education Code Section 48900 and Board Policy #5144.1. Certain violations identified in Education Code Section 48915 are of a serious nature that require recommendation to the Board of Education for expulsion.

Student Case: #2013-136

Cases for Expulsion With a Recommendation for Suspended Expulsion

Education Code Section 48917 provides that a student who has been recommended for expulsion may have the expulsion suspended by the Board of Education. The suspended expulsion is valid for the term of the original expulsion order. The student is placed upon school probation, assigned to a school program, and must remain there until the conditions identified in the Rehabilitation Plan are met.

Cases for Reinstatement After Suspended Expulsion

Type of Item: Consent

Short Description: From time to time, the District needs to dispose of items that are surplus or obsolete. As an alternative, some items may be donated. Approval is requested for the disposal of surplus items otherwise constituting E-Waste (electronic waste) through donation to a charitable organization.

DESCRIPTION OF AGENDA ITEM:

Electronic equipment becomes obsolete and surplus after extensive use and or failure which may not be economically repaired. Items in this condition must be disposed of in accordance with District Policy, California Education Code and environmental regulations designed to protect from electronic waste (e-waste). As an alternative to traditional disposal, and depending on the declared value of the item, some items may be donated. California Education Code Section 17546 (c) provides that if a governing board, “by unanimous vote of those members present, finds that the property is of insufficient value to defray the costs of arranging a sale, the property may be donated to a charitable organization deemed appropriate by the board, or it may be disposed of in the local public dump”. Given the environmental regulations associated to the disposition of electronic equipment, disposal in the public dump is not an option, and other disposal methods are costly.

The District partners with SmartRiverside and their Digital Inclusion Program (a charitable organization) to help provide low income students and their families with computers that they otherwise could not afford. Additionally, SmartRiverside is a state certified e-waste collection facility.

The electronic equipment on the attached list has been withdrawn from various sites and declared surplus/e-waste. Typically the items are considered surplus when they either become uneconomical to repair or obsolete for classroom usage.

FISCAL IMPACT: None

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education 1) find and declare that the electronic equipment on the attached list is surplus and of insufficient value to defray the costs of arranging a sale, and 2) authorize staff to dispose of these items per District policy and California Education Code by donating such to SmartRiverside to be used in their Digital Inclusion Program.

DESCRIPTION OF AGENDA ITEM:

California law provides that public agencies may establish cooperative purchasing agreements wherein one public agency awards a competitive contract to a vendor and allows other public agencies to utilize or “piggyback” on the contract. Approval of a cooperative purchasing agreement does not obligate the Board of Education to issue a contract or appropriate any funds. As indicated below, the Board of Education must find and determine that the use of a cooperative purchasing agreement is in the best interests of the District.

Riverside Unified School District – Nutrition Services Department is a member of the Pomona Valley Co-operative Group. Bonita Unified School District served as the lead district awarding the lowest, responsive, responsible bidders line items on Canned Food Bid 1 #FS07-01-1415C on behalf of the Co-op to A&R Food Distributors, Shamrock Foods Company, Sysco Los Angeles/Sysco Riverside and U.S. Foods Inc. The contract is valid from July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015, with an option to extend for two (2) one year periods.

FISCAL IMPACT: The approval of this agenda item to allow the use of the cooperative purchasing agreement referenced without limit as to dollar amount of the contract. The total dollar amount anticipated to be expended by the Nutrition Services Department is \$400,000.00 per year.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education find and determine that it is in the best interest of the District to approve the purchase of canned goods and condiment supplies in quantities at unit prices quoted, sufficient to meet the needs of Riverside Unified School District. Furthermore, the District will make all purchases in its own name, be responsible for payment directly to the vendor, and is responsible for any tax liability.

Short Description: The adoption of base English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics curricula for moderate/severe special education programs requires Board of Education approval.

DESCRIPTION OF AGENDA ITEM:

Special education students receiving services in moderate/severe special education programs currently do not have instructional materials in ELA and Mathematics aligned to the Common Core State Standards. Special education programs have previously used published curricular guides designed for students receiving an alternate, life-skills based program.

The Special Education Department researched a variety of newly developed instructional materials, met with vendors, and contacted school districts nationwide that have implemented Common Core aligned curricula for this student population. A committee of special education teachers evaluated various curricula and recommended adoption of Attainment for K-6 with supplemental access to Unique Learning System and adoption of Unique Learning System for grades 7-adult.

FISCAL IMPACT: Initial fiscal impact anticipated to be \$70,000 for the 2014-15 school year with a continuing yearly renewal cost estimated at \$20,000. The Special Education Department will work with the Business Services Department to determine the appropriate budget line items within the special education budget to address this adoption.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board approve the Common Core ELA and Mathematics curricula for moderate/severe special education K-adult programs to be implemented in the 2014-15 school year.

Course options are available for high school mathematics students in special education based on Individualized Education Plans (IEPs). One option is for students in special education math classes to take Math 1 for four semesters (2 years). Action is requested to offer twenty credits of Math 1 (ten credits per year) for students in special education math classes.

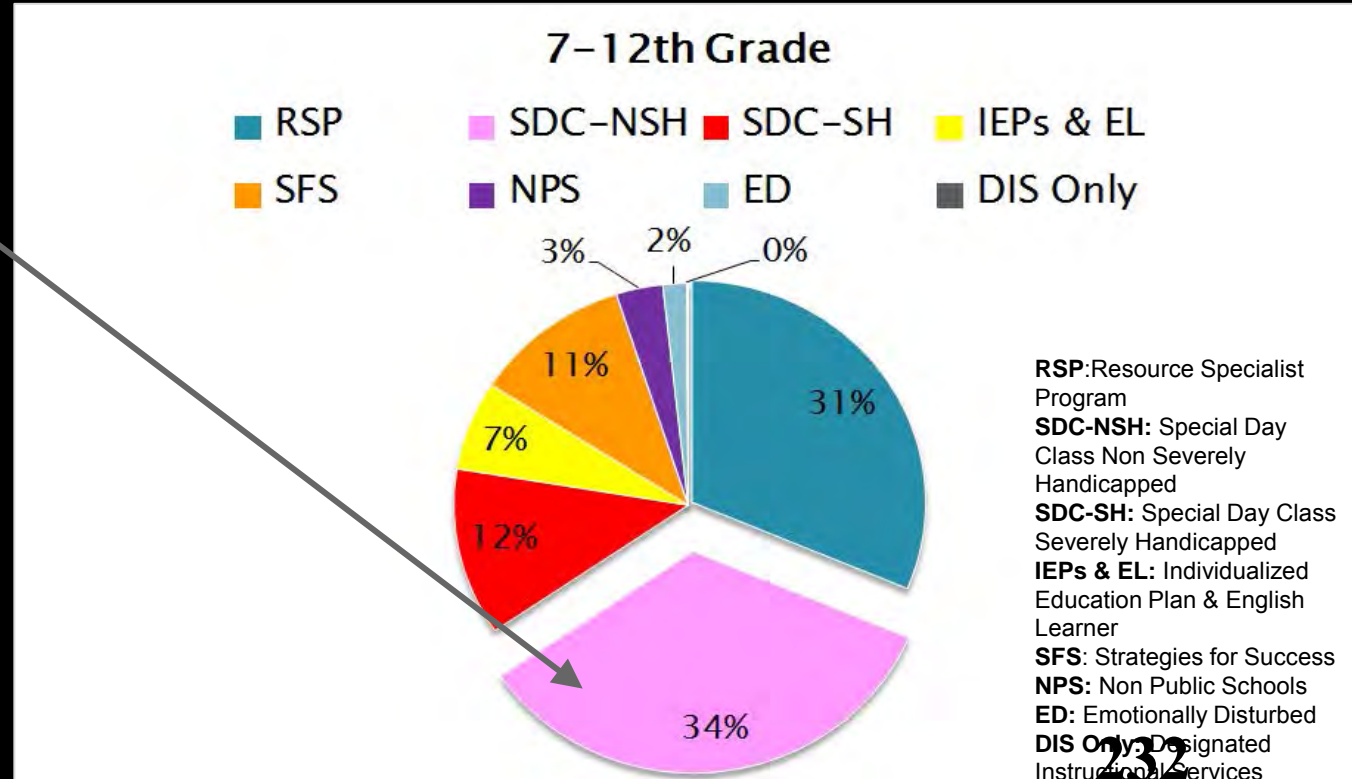

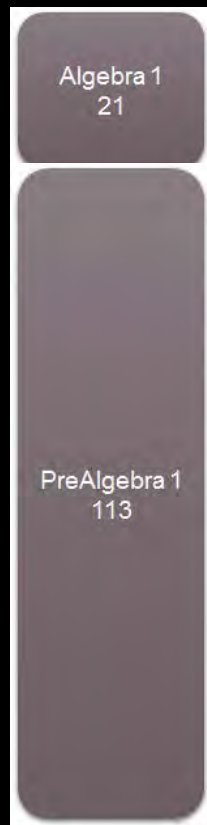
% of Students in Special Education by Program

Special Day Classes (SDC)

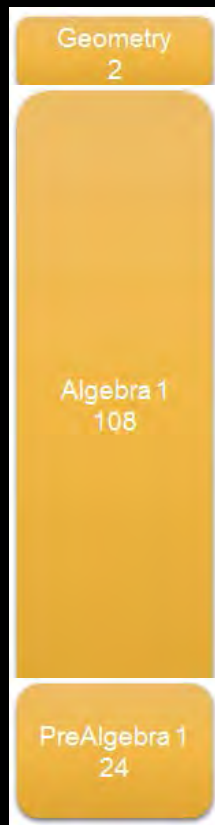

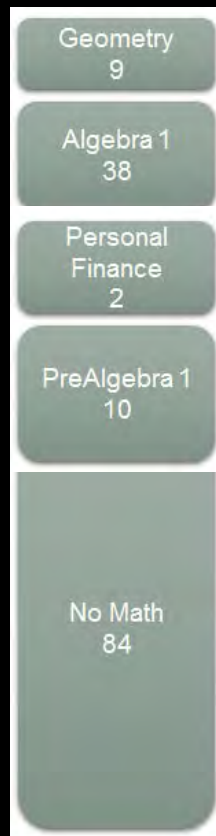
Course Progression for SDC students (2013-2014 cohort)

21 SDC students began their freshman year in an SDC Algebra I course.

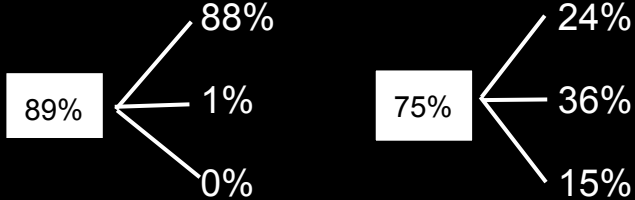
- **7 passed both semesters in 1 year**

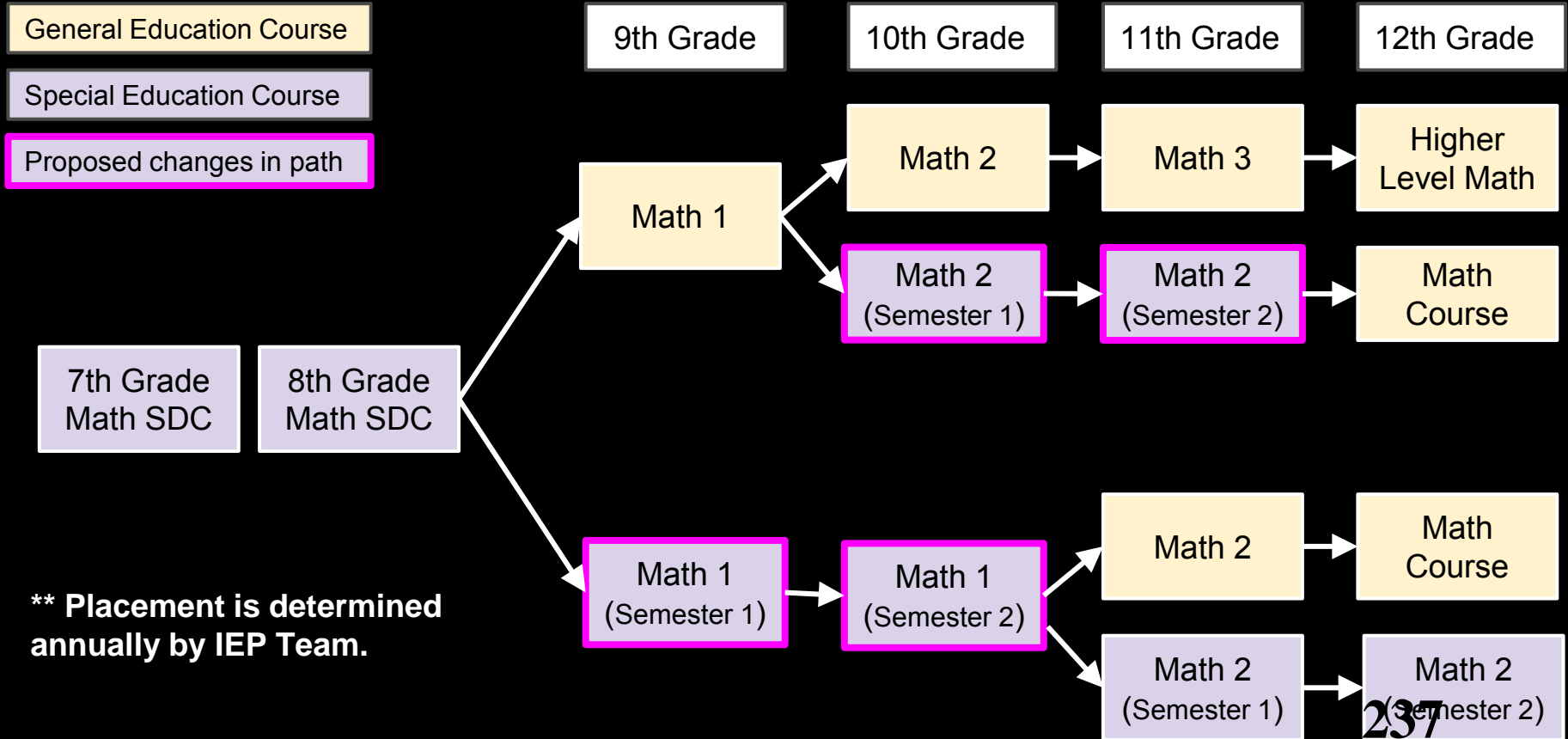

For classified employees, the Board of Education must find and determine that it is in the best interest of the Riverside Unified School District that, at the end of the 2013-2014 school year, that the following positions will be eliminated for a lack of work and/or lack of funds pursuant to Education Code Sections 45117 and 45308.

**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF
THE RIVERSIDE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT APPROVING
THE LAYOFF OF CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL**

WHEREAS, that the Governing Board of the Riverside Unified School District hereby determines that the following positions be eliminated for lack of work and/or lack of funds pursuant to Education Code sections 45117 and 45308.

- Eliminate two (2) three and one-half (3.5)-hour per day Community Assistant – Bilingual positions.
- Eliminate one (1) three and one half (3.5)-hour per day Instructional Assistant position.
- Eliminate one (1) six and one half (6.5)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Bilingual position.
- Eliminate two (2) five (5)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Bilingual positions.
- Eliminate one (1) eight (8)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Computer Resources position.
- Eliminate one (1) six and one half (6.5)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Computer Resources position.
- Eliminate six (6) three (3)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Computer Resources positions.
- Eliminate one (1) six (6)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Special Education I position.
- Eliminate two (2) six (6)-hour per day Instructional Assistant – Special Education II positions.
- Eliminate one (1) two (2)-hour per day School Office Assistant position.
- Eliminate one (1) four (4)-hour per day School Office Assistant position.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing Board as follows:

1. That due to a lack of funds and/or lack of work, the number of classified employees and the amount of service rendered shall be reduced by layoff as specified above, pursuant to Education Code Section 45308.
2. That the Superintendent is directed to give notice of layoff to the affected classified employees pursuant to the requirements of law.
3. That said layoff and reduction in hours shall become effective sixty (60) days after notice is given to affected employees subject to negotiations to the extent required by law.

4. That employees laid off pursuant to the Resolution shall be eligible for reemployment pursuant to Education Code Section 45298.

Short Description: The District's 2014-15 Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators is presented to the Board of Education for approval.

DESCRIPTION OF AGENDA ITEM:

Board approval is requested of the District's Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators:

Each year, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) requires all school districts to submit a Board approved Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators prior to employing teachers with emergency permits and limited assignment permits.

The limited assignment permits allow an employee to be assigned outside the specialty area of their credential, whether it is in general education or in special education. An individual holding the general education limited assignment permit (GELAP) may be assigned to teach departmentalized courses within the authorized field or fields named on the document, such as those generally found in the middle and high schools. An individual holding the special education limited assignment permit (SELAP) may be assigned to serve outside the specialty area of their special education credential while they are completing the coursework for an Added Authorization in Special Education.

Although the employment of temporary permit teachers has greatly decreased during the past several years, it is sometimes necessary to utilize temporary teaching permits to fill vacant teaching positions in the areas of bilingual education, math, science, career technology, health and special education.

Teachers with temporary teaching permits and limited assignment permits receive on-going training and support through the Instructional Services Department, as well as, staff development

opportunities that are provided at each school site. All temporary permit teachers must provide verification that they are enrolled in a state-approved teacher preparation program before an offer of employment is issued.
