Attendance Terms

Compulsory Education	Truant	Chronic Absentee
Children between the ages of 6 and 18 must attend school full-time, unless otherwise exempt.	Student who is absent from school without a valid excuse for more than 30 minutes three or more times in a school year.	Student who is absent from school for 10% or more of the days enrolled in school for any reason (excused and unexcused).

When students are not in school, they miss out on valuable instructional time!



Research and Data Tell Us...

- Attendance is the #1 indicator of dropout and graduation rates
- Chronically absent students in Kinder scored 20% lower in reading and math in later grades and are 2X more likely to be retained
- There is a 25% drop in likelihood of graduating high school in four years when students are absent between 5-9 days per semester
- The effect of chronic absence on graduation rates is cumulative with every year of chronic absenteeism, a higher percentage of students dropout of school





- Attendance improvement plans/agreements


Prevention

- Parent and community events











How Parents Can Support Good Attendance...

- Monitor your student's attendance throughout the school year with an <u>attendance calendar</u> or through your <u>AERIES</u> parent portal
- Be acquainted with District Attendance <u>calendar</u>
- Provide notes or call the school when your child is absent
- Establish morning and evening routines to reduce tardiness
- Develop "back-up plans" and people to help in the case of an unforeseen problem (parent illness, car breaks down, etc.)
- Reach out to school/district staff when you need support and/or resources







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
